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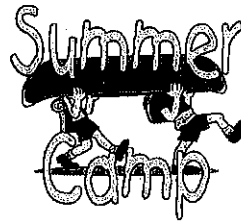

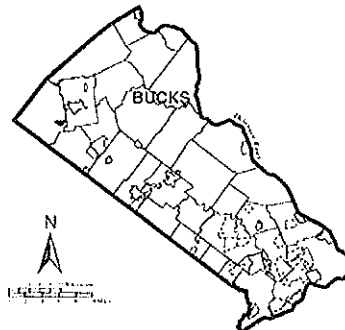

FROM THE PRESIDENT

As discussed in a previous newsletter, speeding is a problem in our borough and poses an obvious danger in the area of our elementary school. It is amazing how many people do not slow down by the school, even when the 15 mph school lights are flashing. What is even more amazing is that a lot of the speeders are parents dropping their children off at the school. In an attempt to protect our children, borough council has approved the installation of two speed humps on Woodview Drive, one at each end of the school property. We have applied for an ARLE grant (Automatic Red Light Enforcement program) to help cover some of the costs and hope to get them installed while school is out for the summer.

This will undoubtedly lead to the question –why don't we do something like this on Main and Broad Streets to slow speeders down? Quite simply, Broad and Main are state roads and we are prohibited from doing anything to them, even lowering the speed limit.

Lastly, has anyone noticed that there is a stop sign at Woodview and Evergreen, right in front of the elementary school? A quick, non-scientific survey reveals that less than half of drivers come to a complete stop, with some not slowing down at all and blowing right through it. Whether or not you agree that this is a reasonable location for a stop sign, it still means stop.

YARD WASTE AND TREE TRIMMING

It is a violation to dump your yard waste on anyone else's property, including borough property. This includes grass clippings, leaves, tree branches, pruning debris and discarded plants. It has been observed that this happens occasionally on borough property, including the park. It might not be obvious with leaves and tree branches, but it is certainly obvious if a potted plant has been thrown away.

Please keep trees pruned that hang over the sidewalks to a minimum height of 7 feet. People should not have to duck under tree branches to walk past your house. And please keep shrubs trimmed so that they don't encroach on the sidewalks.

It is also a violation to discharge grass clippings from your mower onto the street, where they will get washed into the storm drains. (See the storm water article later in this newsletter.) Please be a good neighbor and make sure that your sidewalks and curbs are free of weeds and grass clippings. The borough does not have a public works department so we ask residents to maintain the sidewalks in front of your house or business.

WATER DEPARTMENT

It is that time of the year when our annual Consumer Confidence Report (CCR) is published and distributed to our residents. The report is attached to this newsletter and contains the results of our water testing for 2014, background on our wells and water tower and a question and answer section. If you have any suggestions for additional information we could include, please call the Borough office at 215-536-1761 or stop by and let us know what they are.

We would like to thank everyone for their patience and understanding while we repaired the leak at the water tower and the fluctuating water pressure. We would also like to thank Milford Township Water Authority for allowing us to "float" off their system during the repairs. With the discovery and repair of two (2) major leaks and with both wells being back on line, we are optimistic that everything will run smoothly.



STORMWATER MANAGEMENT EDUCATION

Remember: Only rain down the drain!

As stormwater flows over driveways, lawns, and sidewalks, it picks up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants. Stormwater can flow into a storm sewer system to a stream and eventually to a river, lake, wetland, or coastal waterway. Anything that enters a storm sewer system is discharged untreated into the waterbodies we use for swimming, fishing, and providing drinking water. Polluted runoff is the nation's greatest threat to clean water. By practicing healthy household habits, homeowners can keep common pollutants like pesticides, pet waste, grass clippings, and automotive fluids off the ground and out of stormwater.

Pet Waste and Water Quality. Did you know the deposit Fido made on the lawn this morning is a growing threat to our environment? Did you also know that studies have found that 40 percent of pet owners do not pick up after their pets? The average dog produces a half a pound of waste per day. In 2009, 39,650 dogs were licensed by their owners in Bucks County. That amounts to almost 20,000 pounds of dog waste dumped on the ground, here where we live, every day. If 40% of the pet owners in Bucks County don't pick up after their four-footed friends, the amount of dog waste left behind on the ground to decompose or be carried away by stormwater runoff to our creeks and waterways adds up to a whopping

1,500 tons a year! When pet waste reaches our waterways, the untreated bacteria, nutrients and parasites contaminate the water and pose health risks to humans and other animals. Don't let your dog be a canine sewage pipe. Flush your dog's waste down the toilet, toss it in the trash or better yet, get a doggy compost. Be a responsible pet parent; always remember to Stop, Stoop and Scoop. Your pet(s) and the environment will thank you!

Fertilize Your Lawn, Not Your Driveway! The main objective in applying fertilizer should be to add necessary nutrients in the required amounts and at the proper time to achieve good quality turf. Fertilizer that is accidentally broadcast onto impervious surfaces such as streets, sidewalks and driveways and not swept up will be washed into our streams and creeks when it rains. Nutrients and pesticides in the fertilizer can harm fish and animals in our waterways. Drop spreaders provide a more precise application than rotary spreaders that disperse particles in a wide pattern. Always sweep or blow stray fertilizer back onto the lawn or bag it to use another day. Always follow the instructions on how much fertilizer to apply. Applying more than the recommended amount is not only harmful to your lawn and the environment, it is also an unnecessary expense.

Businesses need to be aware that things they do or products they use in their daily operations can enter the stormwater system and effect our water sources. Runoff from construction sites, spills at fueling areas and chemicals used to keep outdoor areas clean can be picked up by rainwater and whisked into the storm sewer system. Visit the National Menu of Stormwater Best Management Practices (BMPs) site water.epa.gov/polwaste/npdes/swbmp/index.cfm to learn what stormwater BMPs are required by law and what businesses can do to help keep pollutants out of the stormwater system.

BETSY'S BITS

The 2014/2015 school year is over but... the 2015/2016 year is just beginning which means the dreaded school tax bill, also known as the fall tax or THE BIG ONE!

So, I will try to make it as painless on my side as possible. Included in this newsletter is a list of the hours I will be at the Milford Township building to collect in person (see attached flyer). You may also use the drop box (no cash please) outside of the Trumbauersville Borough building OR the drop inside the Milford Township building. The one in Trumbauersville is available at any time, just like for our water/refuse bills but the one in Milford is only available during their office hours which are generally 8 am to 4:30pm weekdays. I also offer on-line payments, E-check or Credit Card through Municipay. You have to access this through my website which is on your tax bill. There is a fee of \$1.50 to use E-check and a 2.4% fee for using your credit card. You can also use bill pay through your bank. If you are unable to come during one of the dates listed but want to pay in person, please call me to make special arrangements. I have no problem meeting you at the Borough building at your convenience. The tax office will be closed the week of July 20th.

I do request, though, that you do NOT leave payments with any office staff, especially cash. This puts them in a very vulnerable situation. It is my job to see that all money is collected and dispersed properly. So.....although we all dislike paying this bill, please remember I had nothing to do with setting the amount due. That comes from the school board we all elect. I'm just the collector☺

STRAWBERRIES!

Now is the best time of the year. It's strawberry time, as evidenced by the Lions club's annual Strawberry Festival on Community Day. They are juicy, sweet and delicious.

No sensation in the world can compare to eating a plump, sun-warmed strawberry straight off the vine. It is all that is good about the world, concentrated into one perfect, succulent bite.

Strawberries are the fifth most popular fruit in the United States. In 2012, America grew more than 3 billion pounds of the berries. In fact, if you took all the strawberries grown in California alone and laid them end to end, they would circle the globe 15 times. That's a lot of berries!!!

Almost everybody loves strawberries. They're good for you — ounce for ounce, they contain more vitamin C than citrus fruit — and a full cup of them has only 50 calories, according to the University of Illinois Extension. PARK/RECREATION COMMITTEE

The Park Committee is actively working on a landscape design plan to plant new trees in our Park. The locations have been selected and now we will choose what varieties of trees to plant. Some trees will be placed to shade our park benches, some will line the driveway as you enter, and some will be staggered on both sides of the walking path, as space allows. FIRE PREVENTION

Burning permits are required for all controlled burning unless the burning takes place in a metal barrel covered with a screen.

If a burning permit is issued, only natural wood can be burned, no treated wood.

With the grill season in full operation, please follow these rules:

- Do not place a grill too close to the house or other structure.
- Do not place a grill near an entrance/exit to your house or use it in your garage.

Before using a grill, make sure all connections to the gas tank are tight and that there are no gas leaks.

If using charcoal, always remember to discard the ashes properly. Before disposing of the ashes make sure that they are cold.

Recreational fires in manufactured fireplaces are OK as long as they are kept 20 feet from any structure and are not placed on a combustible surface, such as a wooden deck.

Bucks County has now changed its Notification System for all county municipalities from Roam Security Alert Network (RSAN) to Everbridge Mass Notification System (EMNS). Trumbauersville borough will now be included in this change as we are now being trained in its usage.

This Comprehensive Notification System will keep everyone informed before, during and after all events whether Emergency or Non-Emergency. This new system can supply messages to all residents and business via phone, cellphone, text, email and twitter. We can now have up to 14' combinations of delivery paths for all our messages.

To place this new system into effect, to notify all Borough Residents and business we will require the following information:

Trumbauersville Municipal Waterworks has been supplying the residents of Trumbauersville and some outlying areas with municipal water since 1938. The primary purpose of the Municipal Waterworks is to provide the highest quality drinking water safely and reliably to its' customers.

This newsletter is designed to provide our customers with accurate documentation and facts. We will explain where your water comes from and give you background data about the system.

There are currently three (3) ground wells supplying the water for Trumbauersville customers. Wells #1 & #2 are located adjacent to the Borough Building on Evergreen Drive and well #3 is located on East Creamery Road. Well #1 was drilled in 1938; well #2 in 1941 and well #3 in 1976.

Our three wells use submersible pumps to draw water from the ground. As water is drawn from the ground, chlorine is added as a disinfectant to kill any bacteria. Water is then pumped to the distribution system, the one hundred thousand gallon storage tank and ultimately to you the customer.

The Trumbauersville water storage tank was put into service in 1938. The structure is a steel tank having a height of 165 feet and a diameter of 25 feet. The tank is located adjacent to the Trum Tavern on the corner of Broad and Main Streets.

land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals, and, in some cases radioactive material and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

1. Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.
2. Inorganic contaminants such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
3. Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff and residential uses.
4. Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are byproducts of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can, also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff and septic systems.
5. Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas productions and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. Food and Drug Administration regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protection for public health.

GENERAL FACTS & INFORMATION

CCR Reports - Residents of Trumbauersville will receive a Consumer Confidence Report annually.

During 2003, the inside of your Water Tower was recoated. Life expectancy of the new coating is between 10 – 15 years.

Trumbauersville customers use, on average, 100,000 gallons of water per day.

A total of approximately three (3) miles of new waterline has been installed in Trumbauersville since 1976 with the vast majority being installed during the Broad and Main Street renovation.

Bill Payments - customers have thirty (30) days to pay their bills or a penalty is charged. Failure to pay bills could lead to the discontinuance of services. If you are having trouble making your quarterly water/refuse payments, please contact the Borough office and notify us of your situation.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q: How many water customers does Trumbauersville currently serve?

A: Trumbauersville has approximately 375 customers.

2015 Bucks County Household Hazardous Waste Collection Events

Why bring your household hazardous wastes to a scheduled event?

Household products containing toxic chemicals, like pesticides, oil-based paints, solvents, cleaning products, weed killers and automotive batteries can be a threat to people and the environment if improperly discarded. Never throw these materials into the trash, as the toxic chemicals may harm sanitation workers, or result in fires in collection vehicles. It is also not safe to pour them into a sink or storm drain as they can end up in the environment polluting the air, water, or soil.
