


When any of the holidays listed below falls during the week, the pickup schedule will shift by one day. Trash is collected on Wednesdays and recyclables are picked up on Thursdays. Example: if a holiday falls on a Monday, trash collection would be Thursday and recyclables would be picked up on Friday. This information will be updated and included in future newsletters and posted on our website, Facebook page and the message board in front of borough hall.

Bulk pick-up is the last Wednesday of the Month. You can put out two items.

Empty trash containers or uncollected trash shall be removed from the sidewalk by midnight the day of collection (Ordinance 209-05)**

OPPORTUNITY

As mentioned in the Winter 2021 newsletter, the borough has been exploring the idea of installing a walking path that would wind through the open space property the borough purchased several years ago. The proposed path would join the existing path at Veterans Park, meander through the adjacent field and exit onto Woodview Drive across from the entrance to the Barrel Run walking trail.

Both grants have match requirements ranging from 15-50% of the total project cost, the borough portion could range from \$30,000-\$90,000. As with all grants, there are stipulations that we must adhere to regarding allowable activities and use of the property. Matching funds will come from the Cellular Fund. The funds in this account are rental revenues and franchise fees from cable and cellular companies that utilize the water tower space for.

Another grant requirement is community involvement. Here is your opportunity to let Borough Council know what you think about the proposed path or any other idea you may have regarding borough improvements you feel are important.

Spring Cleaning

Spring is just around the corner, which means it is time for our annual outdoor Spring-Cleaning efforts.

WEEDS: While sprucing up your yard, please remember the sidewalk and curb areas (including where the curb meets the road) are the property owner's responsibility. Failure to remove weeds from these areas could result in fines. Additionally, be sure to sweep up any cinders that may have accumulated on your sidewalk from the winter's snow plowing efforts.




GRASS: Did you know that it is illegal to discharge/blow grass clippings into the street? Debris left or discharged into the street eventually ends up in our storm water system which could, in the end, lead to clogs. And PLEASE don't leave grass clippings on your sidewalk. If you do not have a mulching mower, or a compost pile, dispose of your grass clippings and any other yard waste properly. Yard waste, seasonal debris (pumpkins), and tree limbs/leaves are not to be deposited in drainage swales, discharged, or deposited onto anyone else's property including borough property such as open space areas and Veteran's Park.


SHRUBS & TREES: Shrubs must be trimmed so that they do not encroach onto the sidewalk and trees overhanging the sidewalk need to be pruned a minimum of 9 feet above the sidewalk. Burning yard waste requires a permit from the Fire Marshall to be obtained **BEFORE** you burn.




Branches should be trimmed so that there is 9' of clear space above the pavement (street and/or sidewalk).



Branches should be trimmed so that there is 9' of clear space above the pavement (street and/or sidewalk). Bushes obstructing sidewalks should be trimmed back so that there is 1' clearance between the bush and the sidewalk.

The pedestrian zone is specifically reserved for walking. The zone must be completely free of overhanging and protruding obstacles, including vegetation. According to the Americans with Disabilities Act *Accessibility Guidelines* (ADAAG), objects must not protrude: (1) lower than a height of 80 inches, (2) higher than 27 inches from the ground, and (3) outward more than 4 inches from posts, buildings or free-standing fixtures. Tree branches or shrubs that protrude into the sidewalk corridor must be cut or trimmed. This means that branches between the heights of 27 to 80 inches must be cut regularly. For people who are blind or with severe vision impairment and using a “white” cane, the maximum 27-inch lower height is important. The sweep motion of the cane will catch the presence of the protruding object. If the object is higher than 27 inches from the ground, then the person might run into it and injure him/herself.

Trumbauersville Volunteer Fire Company

Station 58



We are very fortunate to have one of the finest fire companies in the area providing a high level of service to our residents right here in our borough. Over the past year, the volunteers of Station 58 saw no serious accidents or injuries due in large part to the amount of training firefighters are required to undergo. In 2021, Station 58 participated in 98 individual training events for a grand total of 1,521 hours. Additionally, the members of Station 58 are considered by many in the fire service to be one of, if not the best, trained volunteers in the county.

2021 saw Station 58 responding to 235 calls which totaled 1,488 hours of time in service. When you add training hours, time spent on their numerous fundraising events, meetings, work details and public education, it comes to a grand total of 6,425 hours of volunteer work. These hours do not include administrative time, prep time for events, general maintenance, etc.

Keeping a volunteer fire company up and running smoothly takes a lot of time, effort, and funding. COVID-19 has had a significant impact on this effort, especially the ability to fundraise. Attendance at public events showed a marked decrease, even the ever-popular bingo nights were poorly attended.

The members of Station 58 are thankful for the support our community provided in 2021, without which they would not have been able provide the high level of service and protection our community has come to expect. So please, when you see a fundraising event such as bingo, the monthly hoagies sales, their direct donation letter, etc., show Station 58 your appreciation with the same generosity you have in the past.

Emergency Management

Trumbauersville Borough Safety Information Workshops

Trumbauersville Borough Emergency Management is starting a quarterly Safety Information Workshop for Trumbauersville Borough residents and businesses. These workshops will address a variety of topics with hopes that the more informed our residents are the more prepared they will be for an emergency. Information is key. The more information we have, the better prepared we are which will ultimately result in the best possible outcome for everyone.

Workshops will be held at various locations depending on the topic. Each workshop is expected to be 1 to 2 hours long (dependent on topic, amount of information presented, public interest, and questions received). Additional topics of interest may be incorporated, pending speaker availability.

The first workshop will be held on Tuesday April 19 at 7 PM at the Trumbauersville Borough building. The topic will be 'Environmental and other Hazard Notification and Communication'. It will present how environmental and other hazards could impact the borough, the preparation required to meet the challenge, and the actions and remediation implemented. Additionally, the process of notifying residents, and Bucks County Emergency Management Agency to ensure that everyone is kept informed on the actions the borough is taking to address the hazard, and what steps residents or businesses may need to take will be reviewed.

Community Survey

Recreational Improvements

Recently, the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR), and the Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) – via the Greenways, Trails, and Recreation Program (GTRP) have announced funding programs available to develop, improve or rehabilitate public parks, recreation facilities, and trail projects. Funding is provided through competitive grants with the primary requirements to be met are project eligibility and ability to meet required financial match.

The project put forward by our Parks & Recreation Committee is a walking path that would traverse through the open space that adjoins Veteran’s Park. The proposed path would connect with the existing path at Veteran’s Park, wind across the adjoining field and exit onto Woodview Dr. across from the entrance to the Barrel Run Trail that begins next to the elementary school. At this point, we are awaiting a project estimate from the borough engineer, but it is expected to cost approximately \$140,000. The required match funds that the borough must commit to would be supplied from the Cellular Fund. This fund is used only for revenue received from rental on the water tower from Verizon and T Mobile, and franchise fees from Comcast and Verizon. (Taxpayer funds, aka ‘real estate tax revenue’, is in the General Fund and will not be utilized for this project).

This is where we need your input. Please review the questions below and provide your response to the borough no later than the end of March. Your response can be completed on this sheet and dropped off at the borough office via the drop box. Please keep your comments focused on this topic, and your remarks respectful.

- 1- Do you feel that the new walking path will be a valuable addition to the community?

- 2- If not, what recreational improvement do you feel would be more beneficial?

- 3- Since revenue from the Cellular Fund will be used to meet the match requirements of the grant (range is \$30,000 – \$90,000) there will be no adverse impact to the residents. Yes / No.
