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Borough Council President's Message

Good morning Friends and Neighbors!

I don't know about you, but am I ever glad that Winter is fading into the past and Spring has indeed begun to bud and bloom. As far as Winters go, it wasn't a tough one and sure its fun to fire up the snowblower once or twice, but then I'm done. Bring on the warmer weather, the lawn to mow, the garden to plant, and lots of outdoor activities with friends and family.

I am pleased to report that things largely continue to go well in our little berg. I am often asked, "Hey, what's going on in Trumbauersville?" to which my favorite answer is "Nothing, and that's the way we like it." We don't have a lot of the concerns that some larger area municipalities often have. We don't see a lot of crime. We're not inundated with a lot of legal wranglings, labor issues, or development. We don't have a lot of infrastructure to keep up like miles of roads, sewer, water, and power lines.

Well, I did say 'a lot.' The truth is, Trumbauersville does indeed have some of these concerns to deal with... and for a small borough of under 1000 residents and a land mass of just about four-tenths of a square mile, some of these things are indeed significant.

Trumbauersville is an old borough, incorporated in 1908. Aside from the disappearance of most of the industry that used to dot

our streetscapes over the past century or so, not a whole lot has changed. We have many 'original' homes dating back into the late 1800's. We have a post office, a volunteer fire company, a general store, and an elementary school just as we have for many decades. Heck, the two newest housing developments are 45 years and 24 years old respectively.

Aside from all of this great nostalgia, we also have an aging infrastructure. Our water tower has stood proudly on Main Street since 1938, and the borough bought that tank used! And it still works great. Not a bad track record for a 90-year-old piece of equipment!

Well #2, which is next to Trumbauersville Elementary, was drilled in the early 1940's and has been faithfully serving water to our community ever since. Well #3 on Creamery Road is much more recent having been built in the mid-1970's and is our "heavy hitter" on which we generally rely for the bulk of our water. What about Well #1? Well, that well hasn't been a well for longer than anyone can well remember.

Aging infrastructure. Well #3 is offline undergoing a total renovation to the tune of several hundred thousand dollars, both to

modernize the waterworks and to keep up with environmental regulations on water quality. The several decades old pump at Well #2 recently failed effectively shutting down the borough's water works altogether. Fortunately, the borough recently partnered with Milford Township to construct an 'emergency' interconnection between our water systems, and just in the nick of time. While we had the pump replacement on the calendar, it decided to quit just 2 weeks prior and we needed water!

Engineering and constructing the interconnect was costly. Replacing the well pump was costly, but inevitable. And how about that water tower? It undergoes repairs and maintenance from time to time, coating the inside of the tank, painting the outside of the tank, replacing pipes, patching things, etc. It holds 100,000 gallons. Turns out that is just not enough these days, particularly in the event of a fire emergency. (another reason for the interconnection) Old Faithful is closing in on 100 years. She may need to be replaced in the foreseeable future, and that will be, yes, costly.

Fortunately, Trumbauersville only owns a few roads: Woodview Drive and its offshoots, and part of the Emerald Hollow development. Unfortunately,

those roads are in need of serious repair, including repaving. Aging infrastructure. Is. Costly.

I'm proud to be a member of Borough Council since 2008. We've always kept a sharp pencil on the finances and we still do. Every dollar counts. It's your money and I'm proud to say that Council has been a diligent steward of that money and will continue to be. Cheap? No. Cost conscious? Yes.



SPEED MONITORING SIGNS

The borough has installed speed monitoring signs on northbound N. Main St. and westbound E. Broad St. Each sign captures the volume and speed of traffic, and that data is compiled into a report titled Enforcement Priorities. This report pulls out rate of speed 10 mph over the 25-mph limit and is organized by day of the week, hour of the day, and volume of traffic. This report is downloaded on Monday mornings and sent to the PA State Police (PSP) in Dublin.

This valuable information allows the PSP to focus on the day of the week and time of day their presence in the borough is needed. The PSP have reported multiple times that when they do have traffic stops for speeding within the borough, it has been a borough resident behind the wheel. The traffic data backs this up. Excessive speeds on Saturdays and Sundays (7 am - 4 pm) can't be attributed to commuter traffic.

COMMUNITY DAY


**SATURDAY, JUNE 7TH

The FACTS on Radio Frequencies (RF) and the remote read meters that were recently installed throughout the borough.

Despite news coverage of consumer concerns over smart meter radio frequencies (RF), numerous reports and industry group findings show that smart meter technology is very safe. Current Federal Communications Commission (FCC) standards provide an acceptable factor of safety against the health impacts of existing common household electronic devices and smart meters.

Sensus' metering and automation products and technologies fully comply with the FCC standards and guidelines for environmental exposure to RF, which have been in place since 1985. In 1996, the FCC implemented recommendations from two expert organizations, the National Council on Radiation Protection and Measurements (NCRP) and the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE), in respect to the permissible RF exposure limits for field strength and power density for transmitters. The FCC also adopted the specific absorption rate (SAR) limits for human exposure to RF emissions from devices operating within close proximity to the body as specified within the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) and the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) guidelines which are [available online](#).

The exposure guidelines are based on thresholds for known adverse effects, and they incorporate prudent margins of safety.

A few facts in regards to meter RF

1. RF exposure from a particular device varies, depending on the power of the radio in the device, by distance from the device and by attenuation from intervening objects
 - o The RF exposure from a meter for example drops by a factor of 100 when you move from a distance of 1 foot to 10 feet away
 - o Smart meters are typically located on the outside wall of a residence; the RF exposure inside a dwelling is typically a factor of 10 less than that immediately in front of the meter
2. Sensus smart meters and automation end points typically transmit radio signals for a very small amount of time during a day
3. Data from a large smart meter deployment using Sensus technology indicates that the typical meter transmits less than one second per day and that 99.999% of smart meters transmit for less than one minute per day

Generally speaking, there are a number of existing everyday environmental sources that produce much stronger RF fields than those of a smart metering system. RF energy produced by smart meters is not harmful and is comparable to cellular phone devices, wireless baby monitors, television broadcasts, garage door openers, microwave ovens, cordless home phones, and WiFi networks. In addition, because Sensus metering systems communicate over licensed spectrum, they are in complete compliance with FCC rules and regulations.

WATER METER UPGRADE: In 2021, when America was finding its way back to 'normal' after a global pandemic, the federal government established the American Rescue Plan to help with that endeavor. Trumbauersville Borough received an allocation of \$98,020.43, and the decision was made to use the funds to finish the borough-wide meter upgrade, which started in 2016. Part of the meter upgrade included replacing the remote reader, an outdated piece of equipment no longer carried or supported by the manufacturer.

After reviewing estimates, the Borough Council chose LB Water as the meters and associated hardware supplier at the council meeting on October 21, 2021. In 2022, Alex Buono, the plumbing contractor hired to complete the meter upgrade, started reaching out to residents to make arrangements to change out their old water meters. This work uncovered some issues that caused the project to take much longer. Many homeowners found that their main shut-off valve was frozen and needed to be replaced, while the borough also discovered curb valves that needed replacing.

Once you add all the unexpected interruptions and delays, what should have been accomplished in one year took three. During the last week in March, Alex Buono completed the installation of the Smart Point transmitter, which clicks into place over the black touchpad. (as communicated in the Spring 2024 newsletter)

Improving reporting accuracy to the Delaware River Basin Commission (DRBC) was another reason that contributed to the decision to upgrade the metering system. The DRBC is charged with water resources management. The Delaware River Basin Compact was enacted on October 27, 1961. It marked the first time since the nation's birth that the federal government and a group of states joined as equal partners in a river basin planning, development, and regulatory agency. The Compact is federal law and law in each basin state.

The borough is held accountable for the millions of gallons of water pumped from our wells. That's where the water meter comes into play. While houses and businesses are metered, there are uses that are not. The gallons pumped v. metered gallons consumed have a gap of millions of gallons of unaccounted water. Unmetered water usage, such as fire hydrants or a main break, must be addressed for reporting purposes. We will be working towards increasing the efficiency and accuracy of our water use in the coming year.

This summer we will be instituting a hydrant flushing program. The borough's water engineer has outlined a route to systematically flush the lines. Residents will receive notice of the flushing schedule through mass email, Facebook, and the borough website.

Funding for the upgrades to well #3 was provided by PennVest. The Water Dept is operated as an enterprise fund, a type of fund used in governmental accounting to account for activities that provide goods or services to the public for a fee that is meant to make the entity self-sustaining. It operates in a manner similar to private business enterprises, with the intent that the costs (expenses, including depreciation) of providing goods or services to the general public on a continuing basis be financed primarily through user charges.

Because the current rate structure of our water billing would not support the loan repayment, we were required (by PennVest) to establish incremental rate increases to ensure the revenue from water billing was sufficient to pay back the loan. The cost per 1000 gallons will increase by \$0.20 with the next billing cycle.

Green Lawns – Clean Streams

Pennsylvania's 2022 Fertilizer Law amendments were developed to protect Pennsylvania waterways and the waterways downstream. As a bonus, following the limitations in the law will boost your bottom line by ensuring that your investment doesn't wash away. The 2022 law established the following nitrogen and phosphorus limits for turf fertilizer applications.

- Nitrogen is limited to 0.9 pounds of total nitrogen and 0.7 pounds of available nitrogen per 1000 ft² per application.
 - No phosphorus can be applied unless establishing or repairing turf.
 - Nitrogen and phosphorus rates can be adjusted based on soil test recommendations and/or if using an enhanced-efficiency fertilizer.
- In addition to the nutrient limitations, the law also established application parameters to prevent direct movement of fertilizer nutrients into our streams:

- Do not apply fertilizer if a heavy rain event is expected.

Keep fertilizer away from drainage ditches, storm drains, or water. Maintain a 15-foot buffer from the banks of all waterways.

Remove fertilizer that lands on impervious surfaces (driveways, sidewalks, roads, parking lots).

Working Together for Clean Water

With ever growing acres of managed turf in Pennsylvania, controlling what goes into PA waterways is ALL of our responsibility. Help protect Pennsylvania's waterways by being wise when you fertilize!

SERVICE LINE INVENTORY

The Borough will continue development of the water service line inventory to identify the construction materials for all water service lines, as required under the EPA's Lead and Copper Rule. The initial inventory submitted in October 2024 was the first step in the process of ensuring all public water system service lines are lead free nationwide. The EPA has established rigorous criteria which must be met before a service line can be identified as non-lead.

Excavation will be necessary to conduct visual inspections of some service lines to confirm their material. Any residents who did not submit a water service survey in 2024 are asked to do so. Residents may also contact the Borough Manager to request a plumber come to their home to document the service line entering their home, at no cost.

Updates on the EPA's mandates will be communicated through the borough newsletter.
