What You Can Bring

Up to 25 gallons or 220 pounds of hazardous products. Hazardous products will have cautionary words on the label, for example: *Danger, Warning, or Caution*. Other words or phrases that can signal hazardous products include: *poisonous, hazardous, combustible, flammable, corrosive, volatile, caustic, irritant, explosive, toxic, use with adequate ventilation, or avoid inhaling*.

It is also not safe to pour them into a sink or storm drain as they can end up in the environment polluting the air, water, or soil.

Hot Weather Safety Tips

We all love spending the long, sunny days of summer outdoors with our furry companions, but it's important to remember that like any season, summer comes with its hazards. To make sure you're prepared for whatever comes your way this summer, check out this list of summer safety tips from our experts at the [ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center \(APCC\)](#).

Visit the vet for an early-summer checkup. Make sure your pets get tested for heartworm if they aren't on year-round preventative medication.

Give pets plenty of fresh, clean water when it's hot or humid outdoors as pets can get dehydrated quickly. Make sure your pets have a shady place to get out of the sun, be careful not to over-exercise them and keep them indoors when it's extremely hot.

Know the symptoms of overheating in pets, which include excessive panting or difficulty breathing, increased heart and respiratory rate, drooling, mild weakness, stupor or even collapse. Symptoms can also include seizures, bloody diarrhea and vomit along with an elevated body temperature of over 104 degrees.

Never leave your animals alone in a parked vehicle. Not only can it lead to fatal heat stroke, but it's illegal in several states!

Know that animals with flat faces, like Pugs and Persian cats, are more susceptible to heat stroke since they cannot pant as effectively. These pets, along with the elderly, the overweight and those with heart or lung diseases, should be kept cool in air-conditioned rooms as much as possible.

Do not leave pets unsupervised around a pool. If you plan on spending time near a pool, lake or beach with your pet, make sure you give them fresh water and avoid letting them drink from the [pool](#), or ingest ocean or [lake](#) water. When swimming, introduce your pets to water gradually and make sure they wear flotation devices when on boats. Rinse your dog off after swimming to remove chlorine or salt from their fur.

Keep all unscreened windows or doors in your home closed and make sure adjustable screens are tightly secured. Open unscreened windows pose a real danger to pets, who often fall out of them.

Feel free to trim longer hair on your dog but never shave your dog. The layers of dogs' coats protect them from overheating and sunburn. Brushing cats more often than usual can prevent problems caused by excessive heat.

And be sure that any sunscreen or insect repellent product you use on your pets is labeled specifically for use on animals.

Don't let dogs linger on hot asphalt when the temperature is very high. Being so close to the ground, your pooch's body can heat up quickly, and sensitive paw pads can burn. Keep walks during these times to a minimum.

Use caution when using herbicides and [insecticides](#). When applying these products to your yard it is best to keep your pet away from the area being treated, follow directions on the packaging and prevent your pet from accessing the area until it is dry or has been appropriately watered. [Fertilizer exposures](#) are also more common in the summer, and while typically not serious, they can cause some stomach upset and should still be treated seriously. Keep fertilizers out of reach and your pet out of the treated area until it is dry. Additionally, keep citronella candles, tiki torch products and insect coils of out pets' reach as well.

Be mindful of what you are planting in your garden. Being outdoors means more exposure to [different types of plants](#)—both ornamental and [garden plants](#). It's important to familiarize yourself with the plants in your yard or garden and the potential hazard they may pose to your pets. Identifying possibly harmful plants ahead of time may prevent unwanted exposures. Always keep an eye on your pet when they are outside as even non-toxic plants can cause stomach upset if ingested.

Remember that food and drink can pose one of the biggest threats to pets. To keep them from having food that is too high in fat, or [ingesting a food item that may be toxic](#), it's best that your pet sticks to their normal diet and treats. Be sure to also keep the garbage out of reach, as snooping noses can find their way to hazardous items. If you're enjoying alcoholic beverages at your festivities, be sure to keep your drinks up and away from pets and clean up any spills before they have a chance to take a taste.

Never use fireworks around pets. Exposure to lit fireworks can potentially result in severe burns or trauma, and even unused fireworks can contain hazardous materials. Many pets are also fearful of loud noises and can become lost, scared or disoriented, so it's best to keep your little guys safe from the noise in a quiet, sheltered and escape-proof area of your home.

Sirius, the Dog Star, is the brightest star in the sky.

The Dog Days of Summer are upon us! So, what does this quirky phrase mean? It's more than just a hot spell. The ancient origins of "Dog Days" might surprise you. Learn more.

What Are the Dog Days of Summer?

The term "**Dog Days**" traditionally refers to a period of particularly hot and humid weather occurring during the summer months of July and August in the Northern Hemisphere.

*Dog Days bright and clear
Indicate a happy year;
But when accompanied by rain,
For better times, our hopes are vain*

In ancient Greece and Rome, the Dog Days were believed to be a time of drought, bad luck, and unrest, when dogs and men alike would be driven mad by the extreme heat! Today, the phrase doesn't conjure up such bad imagery. Instead, the Dog Days are associated purely with the time of summer's peak temperatures and humidity.

Why Are They Called the "Dog Days" of Summer?

This period of sweltering weather coincides with the year's heliacal (meaning "at sunrise") rising of [Sirius, the Dog Star](#). Sirius is part of the constellation Canis Majoris—the "Greater Dog"—which is where Sirius gets its canine nickname, as well as its official name, Alpha Canis Majoris. Sirius is the brightest star in the sky, not including our own Sun.

In ancient Greece, Egypt, and Rome, it was believed that Sirius's dawn rising in mid- to late summer contributed to the extreme weather of the season. In other words, the "combined heat" of super-bright Sirius and our Sun was thought to be the cause of summer's sweltering temperatures. The name "Sirius" even stems from the Ancient Greek *seírios*, meaning "scorching."

For the ancient Egyptians, Sirius's dawn rising (known to them as Sothis) also coincided with the Nile River's flood season. They used the star as a "watchdog" for that event.

Of course, the appearance of Sirius does not actually affect seasonal weather here on Earth, but its appearance during the hottest part of summer ensures that the lore surrounding the star lives on today!

Here at the *Old Farmer's Almanac*, we consider the Dog Days to be the **40 days beginning July 3 and ending August 11**. These days occur soon after the [summer solstice](#) in late June, which also tends to be the beginning of the worst of summer's heat.

More About Sirius

The Brightest Star in the Sky

Sirius is the brightest star in the sky if you don't count our own Sun. Under the right conditions, it can even be seen with the naked eye during the day. Sirius is one star in a group of stars that form the constellation Canis Major, meaning "Greater Dog." It's no surprise, then, that the nickname of this big, bold star became "the Dog Star."

Service Line Inventory

The next step.

Service Line Inventory Updates

The Borough completed the required initial water service line inventory in October 2024. The initial inventory was the first step in the process of ensuring all public water system service lines are lead free nationwide. In December 2024, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) expanded their requirements for service line inventories and mandated water systems to complete required service line replacements by 2037. Water systems are required to complete annual updates to their service line inventory.

The water service material for private service laterals (the portion on private property) are currently “Lead Status Unknown” for 60% of the Borough. Confirming service line materials for these lines requires visual inspection at two locations on the service line. Responses to the Borough’s Customer Survey satisfy the visual inspection requirements at one location. Performing a visual inspection at a second location will require excavation. The Borough plans to perform “soft dig” excavations to obtain additional visual inspections starting in 2026. Soft digging uses specialized equipment to excavate a small hole by injecting water or air into the ground and removing dirt through a suction line. Residents who have not already done so should complete and return the Water Customer Survey as soon as possible. The survey form is available online at <https://trumbauersvilleboro.org/sli-2024/>.

Well #3 Progress

From a contract perspective, the following remains:

- DEP will conduct their own inspection of the facility in the coming weeks
- A pre-start-up meeting with the Contractor and the Operator to make sure they’re on the same page before we do an official start-up.
- System start-up and training: The contractor shall demonstrate that all new systems are functional, then the Operating staff will receive training on controls.
- Water quality monitoring for well reinstatement -Well 3 was placed in reserve status to pause water quality monitoring while it was not being used for production. The operator cannot collect the samples needed until the system start-up, (he can’t collect samples of treated water if the system isn’t on).
- Cowan Associates, Inc. will submit the Construction Completion Certification to DEP.
- DEP will issue an operation permit after all paperwork is received.
- Once the operation permit is received, the well will return to active production.




Each spring and summer, hundreds of thousands of honeybee swarms land on residents' properties and in public spaces. These swarms, although usually harmless, cause alarm, and many call 911 or an exterminator, rather than a beekeeper.

Citizens of the Hive is a nonprofit initiative that helps the public report honeybee swarms and hear from local beekeepers in minutes. It's designed to reduce strain on city staff and emergency services while ensuring swarms are safely rehomed, not destroyed.

We're a satellite partner of the California Master Beekeeper Program and a member of the North American Pollinator Protection Campaign.

In PA, we have 216 beekeepers ready to respond to swarm reports. Many beekeepers are happy to collect swarms as a public service and as a way to replenish their hives after this year's particularly high winter losses.

Report a Bee Swarm

Found a swarm? Reporting it helps beekeepers protect bees and your community.



1. Report a Swarm

Bee swarms aren't aggressive, but they should always be handled by a beekeeper.



2. Beekeepers Respond

We alert local beekeepers who are happy to collect swarms to strengthen their hives.



3. Bees Are Safely Relocated

The swarm is carefully relocated to a managed hive where it can thrive.

What is a swarm?

A swarm forms when thousands of bees leave their hive with their queen to search for a new place to live.
